Like many first time parents, I wasn't sure what to expect after bringing home my new tiny human. Would my days fly by as feelings of pride and joy rushed through me with each new baby smile, roll, crawl, word, and step? Would I feel torn about my decision to leave a job I loved and worked hard to deserve? Would I ever stop feeling confused about breastfeeding or how to get my baby to sleep through the winkt?

Well, here we are, one full year later and I think I can truthfully say that I have felt (and maybe still feel) all of these things. I feel amazingly blessed to have been able to stay at home to care for my daughter each day and watch her grow into this amazing little person. But sometimes I still miss the career that used to fill my days and become over-

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whelmed by the perpetual question of "Am I doing this right?"

For me, that is why these parent education classes are so important. For me, they help to bridge the gap between my current and former life by providing some structure to my otherwise unstructured day. They provide me with time to focus solely on my child (and not the piles of dirty laundry) and watch as she learns new skills each week. They allow me to meet other parents, new and veteran, who are in a similar life stage and who can relate to both the struggles and joys of parenting. And moreover, these classes give me the opportunity to gain confidence in how I am raising my child as we cover various discussion topics each week that provide guidance and best practices to help us succeed. Since these classes have been such an important part of my and my daughter's relationship over this first year of her life, I knew they must mean a lot to other parents as well. *(continued, next page...)* Pg. 4

So I asked some of the other moms in our class to share why this program is important to them and their child, and this is what they had to say:

Gohar, with her son David (11 months), says that this class is important to her because when she talks to other moms about issues with her kids and they share similar issues with their kids, that it makes her feel less crazy!

Dorothy, with her son Nolan (12 months), says that this class is important because it provides support for new parents and helps us to consciously engage our children in activities that promote their development.

Tsolair, with her daughter Sophie (10 months), says that this class is important to her because it gives her an opportunity to socialize with her friends as well as allows Sophie an opportunity to play and interact with other infants. She also enjoys participating in the discussion topics as it reassures her that what she is experiencing with her child is similar to other moms in the group.


Anomeh, with her daughter Ella (5 months), says that she felt very alone when her daughter was experiencing severe acid reflux. This class is important to her because when she was able to talk with other moms whose babies shared the same condition; she felt relieved to know that her baby was not the only one.

So, as you can see, this class is a terrific resource for parents with infants who are looking



for friendship, support, and guidance as they navigate through those first 12 months of baby's life. ~~~

A new guideline was introduced this term, mostly for the parents. Teacher Barbara requested the class to be screen-free. She reminded us that we are here to be with and learn with our children, to observe and support each other, and to connect on a personal level. As we all know, it's hard to do that with a cell phone distracting us.

The last few weeks



we have been discussing discipline. One big concept that Teacher Barbara really wants us to keep in mind is that "It's not personal; it's developmental". This can be difficult to keep in mind with a headstrong toddler in our lives, but is such a good reminder that our children are testing us in order to LEARN about our rules and limits (not just to make us tear our hair out). After all, the word discipline comes from the word disciple which means to teach. So, instead of jumping to punishments right away, remembering that "it's not personal, it's developmental" can help us become better parents and teachers to our little ones.

Last week we started work on a wooden turkey centerpiece. We began by sketching each child's hand on a sheet of paper. This outline will be used to personalize a wooden turkey that we will then be able to decorate and use for Thanksgiving.

Wonderful Learning Opportunities at the Columbus Site

What a great class we have this semester! Such energetic and diverse personalities in all these kiddos; ages ranging from newborns, to three-almost-four! It's so essential to have these multiage classes available to us. At the Parent Ed Program, not only do we get to involve the whole pre-Pre-K family, but everyone has a great deal we can learn from one-another!

We are having so much fun, and we all love Ms. Jane! Her discussions are informative and interesting; we've talked about codependence/Independence, separation anxiety, and how it comes and goes in stages...about teaching our children about awareness of their surroundings, and beginning clear instructions early-on, and sleep patterns in different ages, which I found particularly interesting. I also really enjoy when moms chime-in with their own experiences, as I know that I learn just as much from my peers, as I do from my instructors.





Ms. Jane's "Story Time" and songs, are such a delight for the kids and parents, alike. We love to dance, and sing songs like "If you're Happy and You Know It," and "Open, Shut Them." We all especially love the gentle songs (that I rarely hear anywhere but Ms. Jane's class), like "Butterfly, Butterfly," and "Rainbow Song." These kids are learning so much; crafts like marker-tie-dye coffee filter butterflies, pasta necklaces, and painting pictures have really helped to focus these little jitterbugs. I'm constantly amazed at how the timespan of 'how-long-will-they-sit-there-quietly?' is stretching. But it's no wonder, because they all generally play so well to-gether, whether it's push-cars, or play dough!

Cleaning up is another fun and educational time, as the children are learning to clean-up after themselves, and each other. My favorite memory from the first day of class, was cleaning up the chairs. Seeing all the little ones learning how to "carry" in the chairs, after snack time...seeing all the moms holding the brunt of the weight... All the really little walkers, toddling after the rest... Ha, ha! So precious!

At the Columbus School site, though the "Rug-Time" and "Parachute Time" areas are separated from the outdoor play and snack area by a little bit of a walk, the slight challenge poses a world of learning opportunities for the kids. Going from place to place brings an added awareness to the difference in surroundings. Ms. Jane spends a good deal of time, reinforcing the children's sense of focus and awareness, and is helping to guide us all in engaging our kids more in focused activity. And since the site is at an elementary school, there's also the added excitement, of seeing "big kids", and the element of preparation, in exposing our little ones to an actual school campus, very early on. I know that I always felt more comfortable going to a new school, or starting a new year, if I had been to the school before...I love leaving the school and saying to Aria "Say bye, school! One day, you're going to go to BIG school, like this!" (insert toddler clapping, here. ©).

Lastly, I'd like to mention that I feel a great deal of the success of our Monday class, is due to having so much help! We have great parents that help out with each other's kids, (some new, but many returning), AND, we also have one of the most amazing Class Assistants, Ms. Rosa! most memorable moment here at the program was when her daughter Chloe learned to be independent. Chloe had always been social but when she turned


Chloe learned to be independent. Chloe had always been social, but when she turned two years old she became more attached to Naomi and didn't want to go out and play with the


