What is parent education preschool program?

Since 1952, the Parent Education Program at Glendale Community College has been providing classes designed for parents and their children from birth to age five. The program encompasses a range of classes tailored to various developmental stages, including classes for newborns, older infants, toddlers, 2-year-olds, 3-year-olds, 4- year-olds, 5-year-olds, and even multi-age classes that allow parents to bring more than one preschooler. The curriculum also features specialized classes, such as Positive Parenting, classes for working parents, and focused sessions like the Parent Association class, Anger Management, and Fathering. The program's flexibility is evident through its availability of both evening and daytime classes, accommodating different schedules.

Each class is led by a knowledgeable parent education/early childhood teacher with a Master's degree, accompanied by an assistant teacher. In the traditional face-to-face classes, parents actively participate alongside their children in 2- or 3-hour sessions, fostering a collaborative and mutually beneficial learning experience. The program cultivates a secure, inviting, and enriched environment for all participants. Classes for parents and children are also offered online where children engage with the instructor in fun learning activities from home, and parents have access to parenting and child development information and participate in instructor led group discussions.

For children, the curriculum encompasses a diverse array of age-appropriate activities. These include fostering fine motor skills through activities like puzzles, Legos, scissors, crayons, paints, bead stringing, and artistic projects. The development of gross motor skills is also promoted through activities involving riding toys, climbing equipment, slides, block building, and ball play. Furthermore, online learning materials are provided for parents and children to access at their convenience. Age-appropriate at-home learning activities are discussed and offered, and organized online sessions led by the teacher include songs, stories, science activities, finger plays, rhythms, rhymes, and felt board activities. The virtual setup also facilitates opportunities for children to interact with their peers and teacher.

The program's emphasis for parents centers around active participation and interaction with their children. Parents have the chance to observe and document their children's socialization and development. Establishing a support network with fellow parents is encouraged, and instructional time is dedicated in each class for parents to engage with the teacher. The parenting curriculum is discussion-oriented, encompassing all facets of child development, exploration of parenting theories and philosophies, and the application of positive parenting skills. Parents delve into understanding typical age-related behaviors, building self-esteem in both their children and themselves, implementing effective behavior management (discipline) strategies, enhancing communication skills, developing social skills, ensuring proper nutrition, and developing a sense of confidence and relaxation in their parenting role. The curriculum is enriched through guest speakers, videos, and field trips, all aimed at enhancing the learning journey for parents and their children.

Parent Education Course Descriptions

PARED 10 Infants 1 (0 - 8 Months)

This course focuses study on parenting children from birth through 8 months of age as of the cutoff date each semester. Parents (or caregivers) attend class with one or more children of the designated age.

PARED 11 Infants 2 (9 – 16 Months)

This course focuses study on parenting children from 9 to 16 months of age as of the cutoff date each semester. Parents (or caregivers) attend class with one or more children of the designated age.

PARED 12 Toddler 1 (17 – 23 Months)

This course focuses study on parenting children from 17 to 23 months of age as of the cutoff date each semester. Parents (or caregivers) attend class with one or more children of the designated age.

PARED 20 Two-Year-Olds

This course focuses study on parenting the two-year-old child. Parents (or caregivers) attend class with one or more child of the designated age.

PARED 21 Two or Three-Year Olds

This course focuses study on parenting the two and three-year-old child. Parents (or caregivers) attend class with one or more children of the designated age.

PARED 30 Three - Year-Olds

This course focuses study on parenting the three-year-old child. Parents (or caregivers) attend class with one or more children of the designated age.

PARED 31 Three or Four-Year-Olds

This course focuses study on parenting children from the age three through the pre-kindergarten years. Parents (or caregivers) attend class with one or more children of the designated age.

PARED 41 Pre-Kindergarten

This course focuses study on parenting the pre-kindergarten aged child (4 to 5 years of age). Parents (or caregivers) attend class with one or more children of the designated age.

This course focuses study on parenting children from birth through the pre-kindergarten years. Parents (or caregivers) attend class with one or children ages birth to five years old.

PARED 54 Working Parents

This course focuses study on the working parent's role in parenting children from birth through the pre-kindergarten years. Special attention is given to the challenges of raising a child while working full-time.

Parents attend class with one or more children of the designated age.

PARED 60 Positive Parenting Skills

This is a parent only course and focuses instruction on positive parenting methods that will redirect inappropriate behavior of children and adolescents of all ages. Issues of concern to single parents and parents of school-age children will be discussed as needed by the students enrolled. Court referred parents are welcome.

PARED 70 The Politics and Practice of Parent Associations

Parent Education 70 is designed for students who wish to learn about the parent's role in parent/teacher associations. Practical experience is provided in areas of volunteerism, designing school-based family enrichment activities, parent association management and participation, as well as organization of school-based newsletters.

PARED 103 Anger Managment

Is designed for parents who seek assistance in managing their expressions of anger in order to parent more effectively and use appropriate discipline strategies.

Lecture 16 hours.

The Parent Education Program was initiated by Mrs. Toll in 1952 at Glendale Community College, starting with only two classes. By the academic year 1953-1954, the number of classes expanded to nine, highlighting the need for improved communication among the classes. This led to the creation of a student association, which is now famously known as the Glendale College Parent Education Association (GCPEA).

Today, the Parent Education program offers a diverse range of classes, spread across various locations within Glendale and its neighboring areas. Now serving many more families, this program provides a unique opportunity for both parents and children to interact with peers and become accustomed to group settings. Professional parent educators impart essential parenting skills in an environment designed to facilitate learning and development. This involves observation, active participation in classroom activities, and engaging in class discussions.

The topics covered in these discussions vary, adapting to the children's ages and the everyday experiences of the parents. Enrolled students in the Parent Education Program automatically become members of the Glendale College Parent Education Association (GCPEA). This association is affiliated with the non-profit organization Glendale College Foundation, Inc. GCPEA fosters communication among classes through class representatives and reporters, while also organizing informative talks and various events throughout the year. Steering the events and behind-the-scenes efforts is the GCPEA Executive Committee, a dedicated group of volunteers. Additionally, the Parent Education Director serves as an advisor to the Executive Committee and is the official spokesperson for program policies at Glendale College.

The association's mission revolves around raising funds for essential operational costs and arranging educational and social events beyond the classroom setting. Despite being a "tuitionfree" program, the costs of running Parent Education are not negligible. Glendale College covers expenses like facilities, faculty, assistants, and a modest budget for office supplies, paint, and construction paper. However, the program heavily relies on the generosity of external contributions from businesses and individuals to sustain its success.

The funds raised by the association cover various operational expenses, benefiting the learning environment. These funds are used to procure vital teaching tools, enhance classrooms, and upgrade sites. The purchases include items used on a weekly basis, such as children's cups and napkins during snack time, art supplies like glue and crayons, children's books, toys, trikes, musical equipment, tables, chairs, storage sheds, cleaning supplies, and much more. The fundraising efforts not only benefit current students but also have a positive impact on future students' experiences in the program.
